Many of the gravestones in our cemeteries where mined and then carved at his Granite Co. In 1870 a 5 foot granite cross was made and given to the Episcopal church in Johnstown to mark the site of Sir Wm Johnson's gravesite.

He was recognized as an mechanical genius, had at least 28 patents on inventions to his credit.

He operated a stage for hunters to be driven north. And he raised hunting dogs behind his house.

He was a member and past Sachem of the Sacandaga Tribe of Red Men (I. O. R. M.)

James died at his house on South Main Street and his funeral was held at the house also.

The death of Mrs. Emeline N. Cole, wife of James A. Cole, aged fifty-six years, nine months and one day, occurred at her home in this village on Saturday morning, May 23, at five o'clock, after an illness of several months.

Mrs. Cole was a daughter of the late William A. Smith and was a native of Northville, having been born in this village on August 22, 1839. Forty-six years ago she united with the Northville Baptist church, and has even since been one of its most faithful and efficlent members: her christian character and rare qualities of mind winning for her the highest esteem from those with whom she has associated.
